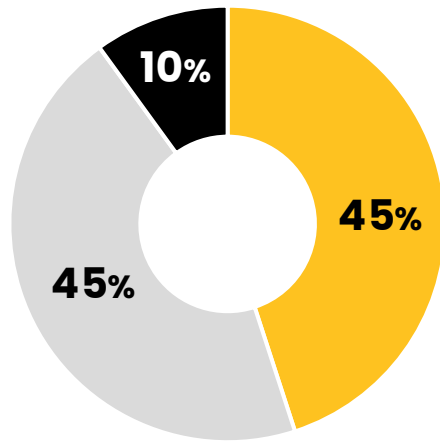

Workers

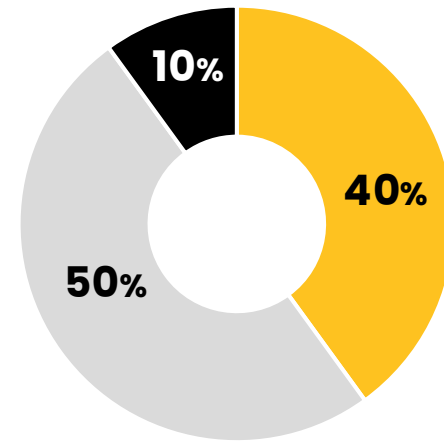
➤ How important is it to learn about how to incorporate AI into your work for your future career development?

➤ How important is it for workers to upskill in AI in order to advance their careers at your organization?

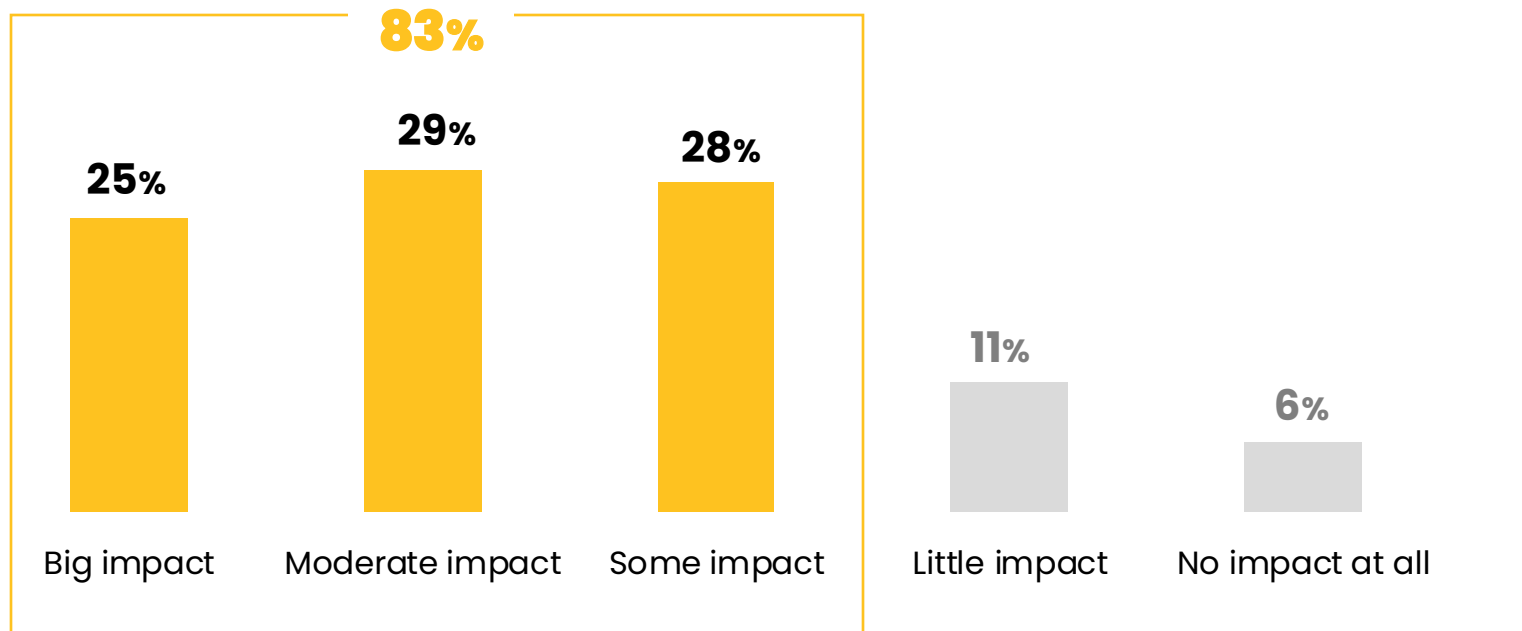

A majority of workers (83%) say that learning more AI skills and tools will have an impact on their ability to remain employable

What impact will learning more AI skills and tools have on you remaining employable?

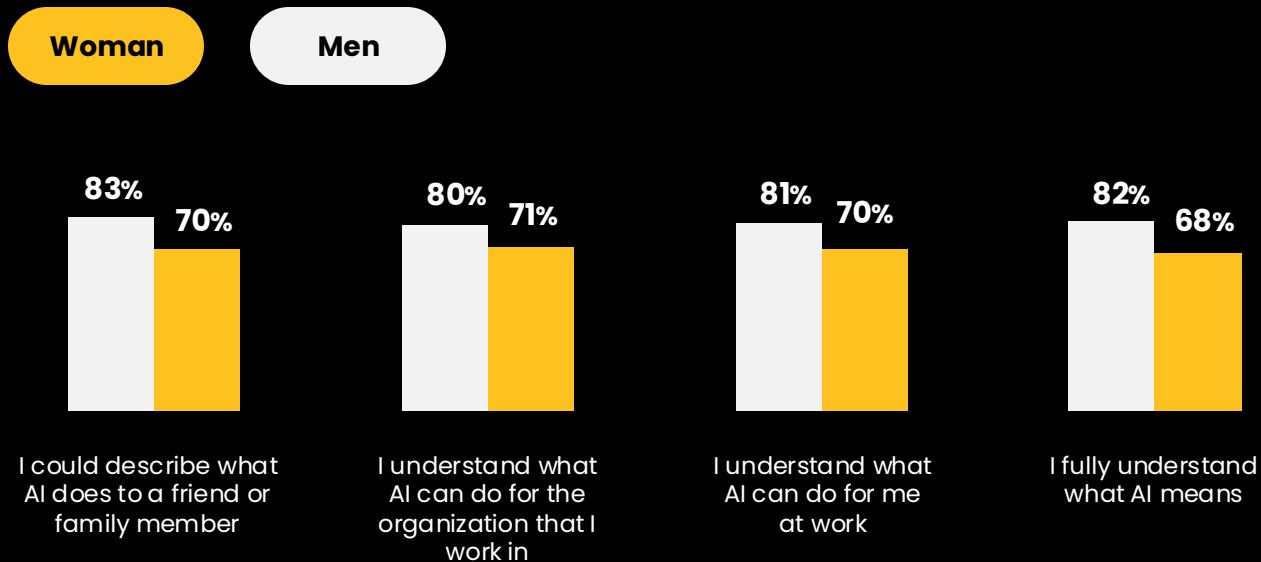


Men (87%) are more likely to think AI skills will have an impact on their employability compared to **women (79%)**



Women are less confident than men in their understanding of AI

How much do you agree or disagree with the following statements? (Top 2 Agree)

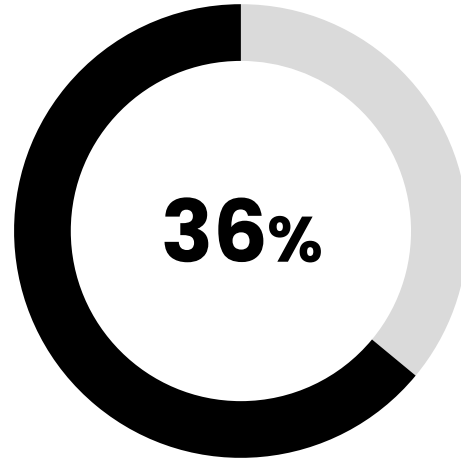


Women aren't convinced AI will positively impact their careers

Men are 50% more likely than women to report that AI skills give them more career opportunities.

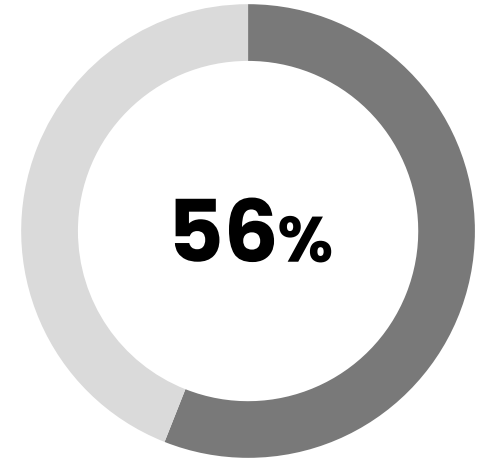


Employers underestimate how often workers use AI

Think their workers use A.I. weekly



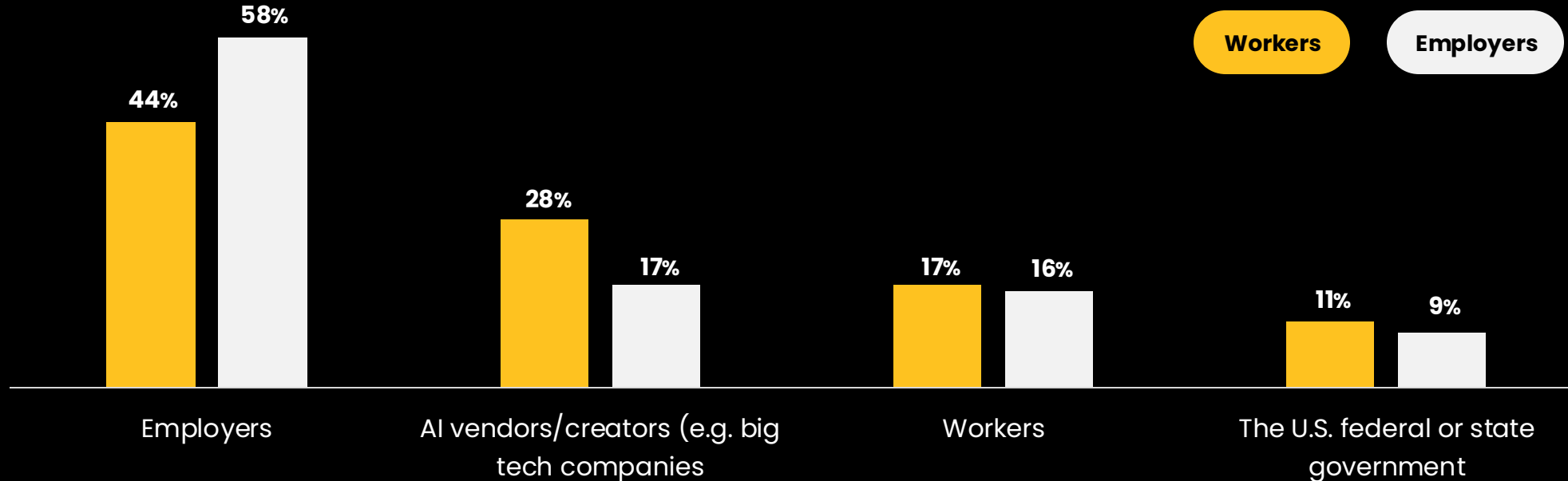
Employees

Workers and employers agree that the responsibility of training workers in AI is on employers

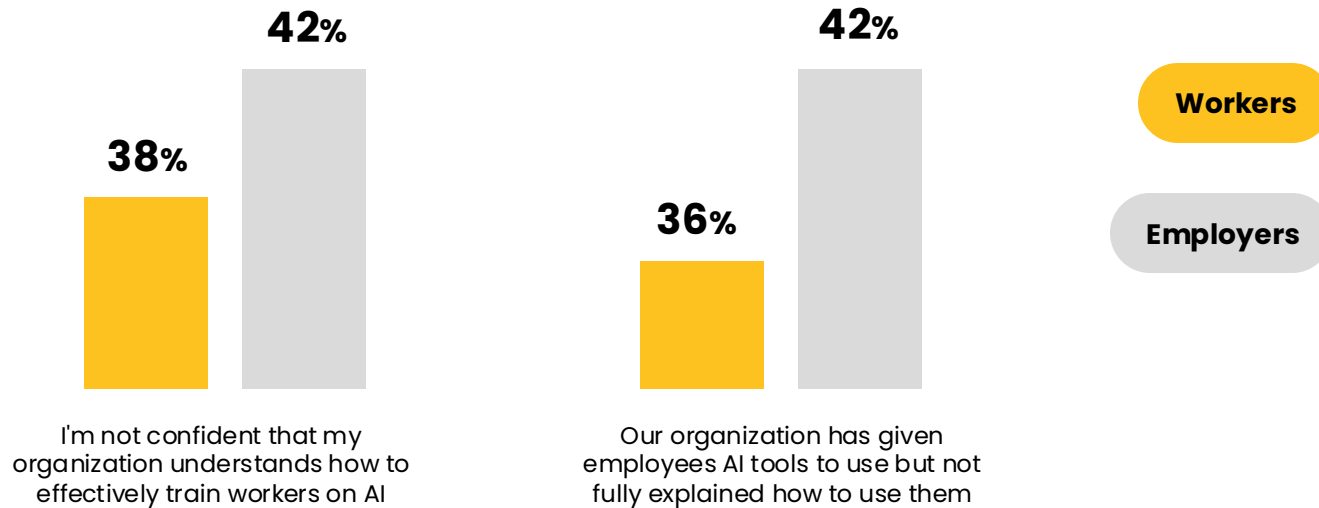
Who is most responsible for providing the opportunities to train American workers in artificial intelligence (AI): is it employees, employers, government, AI vendors?
